Purpose of course:

The main purpose of the course is to give an outline of the medical and clinical application of cultural anthropology. Medical anthropology aims to demonstrate a systematic study of human nature, the cross-cultural similarities and differences of health, illness and healing.

The students should:

- Develop familiarity with the importance of lay beliefs of health, disease risks and illness in the process of health care
- Develop an understanding of the cultural characteristics of pain behavior, sexual and reproductive behavior
- Develop an understanding of the cultural aspects of death and dying
- Develop familiarity with the role of cultural stress in health and disease and the mechanisms of stressrelated disease

Outcome requirements:

Knowledge

- Getting acquainted with the role of cultural factors in disease development in conjunction with physiological processes (such as pain, stress or nutrition)
- Getting acquainted with the cultural roots of communication problems arised during medical care

Competences

- Being competent in recognizing the cultural characteristics when obtaining medical history
- Being competent in effectively managing health care in altering cultural settings and exploring the cultural origins behind noncompliance

Attitudes

- Giving advice based on the etiological factors taking cultural aspects into account
- Providing health care for patients regadless their ethnicity or cultural identity

• Communicating effectively with emotional intelligence and empathy both personally and on the phone even by means of a translator

Autonomy and responsibility

- Working effectively in exploring cultural background of disease and applying this in clinical decision making
- Working with responsibility in health care system
- Providing secure health care for patients in diverse cultural settings
- Helping with effective clinical decision making

Topics:

- 1. Introduction to cultural and medical anthropology
- 2. Medical anthropology of body image and nutrition
- 3. Medical anthropology of stress and stress-related disease
- 4. Medical anthropology of pain, sexuality and gynecology
- 5. Cultural aspects of health care
- 6. Medical anthropology of death and dying

Methods:

- Practice
- Team-work

Criteria of the competition of the course:
